

A developmental approach to teaching respect for human life.



Respecting Life Begins with Me Program

OBJECTIVE:

Respecting Life Begins With Me (RLBWM) is a developmental education program designed to teach children (K-12) to Respect Life, which is central to our Catholic Faith, with the understanding that respecting life begins with their relationship with God and others as well as a relationship within the family, the school, the church, and finally to the outside community. The awareness begins with a conversation about how we are unique creations of God and how loved we are by Him. As part of that awareness the lesson extends to other populations including: the unborn, special needs persons, the elderly, sick and terminally ill, human trafficked, imprisoned, and the death penalty.

The program progresses from Awareness to Prayer, Influencing their Sphere and finally Influencing their Community.

Older grades focus on chastity, at-risk behaviors, and healthy dating.

WHEN:

Program is implemented in October (Respect Life Month) with ongoing service projects (Corporal Works of Mercy) throughout the year which can be incorporated in your school calendar. The program can be kicked off with a Respect Life Mass. Children (typically 8th grade) process in with roses (symbol of life) for Our Lady, a school banner and a Respect Life theme.

Your school may spiritually Adopt a Baby which entails naming the baby, following the baby's development and growth (creating a chart), including prayers of petition for the mothers and the unborn, or creating a spiritual bouquet for moms in crisis.

PROGRAM:

Service projects include attending the Life Chain in October, attending the March for Life in January at the La Leche Shrine, installing crosses at your parish or on the Mission grounds in March.

No two fingerprints are alike. Each of us are individually uniquely made by God for His purpose and plan. Each of us has a place in His wonderful masterpiece of life.

In this exercise your students will complete is a **take-home project** with their family. Each family member will place their fingerprint on the page (copy attached). Each family member participates in this project as a reminder that God has joined us together, knitting our family nucleus all in part of his wonderful Divine Providence. Feel free to decorate your fingerprints as favorite characters, be creative.

For an in-classroom exercise during Respect Life Month, you could share, discuss, and give examples of **Acts of Kindness**. Then, each time you recognize an act of kindness displayed by a student, you could recognize that in a special way. **You can also make a classroom wreath with the acts of kindness displayed as flowers or leaves.** The objectives listed above can be used to initiate kind behaviors.

Take-home projects can be sent home 2 weeks before the due date. Upon return grade and display.

Dear Parents,

- 4. Feel free to decorate the fingerprints.
- 5. Once this is dry, kindly assist your child in answering the prompt. An example of how "Our Family Shows Love By..." How does your family show love? How do you spend time together or help each other? When do you pray together?

Subject: Respect and Love Each Other (**PRAYER**)

Grade: 50% demonstrates knowledge of concept, 40% effort, 10% neatness

Size: Index Card 3X5 or 5X7

Due Date: Thursday, OCTOBER 29, 2020 to your teacher

Objective: Jesus tells us to Love One Another and

Imitate Christ and follow in His footsteps.

We are all made in the image and likeness of God

and should be treated with respect.

Students are instructed to create a prayer card. The focus of this assignment is to bring about awareness to the children that even though they might have difficulties in relationships with their siblings, friends, or fellow students, they need to respect and pray for one another. Encourage the students to focus on their own relationships in their families and with friends. Explain to them that it may be difficult when someone makes them sad, mad, hurt or angry, especially someone close to them, but they need to love this person and forgive them. They should never scream at, yell at or use physical force to express their feelings of hurt or anger. This is never a solution. Instead they need to talk it out with the person and use prayer as a tool to help heal the situation. Jesus calls for us to forgive even the playground bully and asking Him to help intervene in the situation is always the best route to go.

This project includes an **original prayer** written by the student for someone they might be having difficulties with or someone they need to treat with kindness, or someone they want to pray for. Their prayer should begin with this prompt: **My prayer for life is... or I follow in Jesus's footstep by...** Then, on the blank side of the index card, they need to depict this prayer with a **colored drawing** either using colored pencils or crayons.

Good luck. Encourage their creativity.

Subject: Respect for All Those in Society (**INFLUENCE YOUR SCHOOL**)
Grade: 50% demonstrates knowledge of concept, 40% effort, 10% neatness

Size: 8 ½ X 11" paper

Due Date: Thursday, October 29, 2020 to your teacher

Objective: We are all made in the image and likeness of God and have human dignity.

God formed you and knew you before you were born.

Think of how you can follow the *Gospel of life* and imitate Christ by showing concern for the unborn, elderly, special needs/handicapped, imprisoned and human trafficked.

Are you ready for a challenge? There are many attacks on human life today, in your school and sometimes in your community. Have you ever seen someone mistreat someone else or witnessed someone being bullied, or denied friendship? Would you step in to help, ask for it to stop, or would you remain silent? Standing up for someone else is scary but also very brave. It is a way to imitate and follow in Jesus's footsteps.

Our faith teaches us to treat all people with respect and dignity, no matter their race, religion, social status, education, or stage of development. We know about and have seen acts of violence in our country and world. Create a picture to show how you would defend all lives.

You have an opportunity to show kindness, bravery, and a commitment to follow in Jesus's footsteps. Create a beautiful poster showing respect for all those in society who are mistreated, neglected or in danger. Your poster will focus on human life: the unborn, handicapped, the sick, the poor and homeless, another race, the elderly or other respect life concerns.

How can we show the need for God's love through your poster? Do we see all people as equal and worthy of protection? Can you influence your school, through your poster, to respond with kindness and love to what is happening in your school or in our culture today? You have the ability to use your artwork to influence someone and bring about awareness to the way human life should be treated.

This project is about human life which God asks us to hold sacred, respect and protect. Projects depicting animals or environment although important will be disqualified

You may use markers, colored pencils, or crayons.

You are a witness ... to acts of kindness/ bravery and acts of violence. You have a voice and an opportunity to shape the culture you will be living your life in. Your voice should be heard especially when defending life. that involve all classes in the contest. You must receive entries from all the classes in your
school or program in order to win a prize. If you do not meet the 100% participation requirements,
check "no" on line 3. B. of Submission Form. If yes, be sure to indicate your choice of prize from the prize
selection sheet.

- 3. Original Work All entries must be entirely original works.
 - a. **Text Quotes** must be properly cited indicating the author, source, date it was written and date the quote was retrieved. (APA or MLA citation formats preferred)
 - b. Professional photos of family members need a written release in order to be used.
 - c. We are NOT able to accept entries with the following:
 - i. * Pictures, images, graphic design elements not originally generated by the student (for example, images from Google)
 - d. IMPORTANT: Any entries that are not *strictly* original works will, unfortunately, be excluded from the contest due to copyright concerns.
- 4. Only entries that focus on human life will be chosen.
- 5. Winning Entries
 - a. Winners are chosen by the School, Religious Education Program, or Home School Association.
 - b. Winners can be determined by Principal/DRE/Association Coordinator or by a panel of "judges" (i.e.: RL Team, KOC, etc.).

 - d. One separate winning essay entry may be chosen for Level 3.

- 7. A certificate signed by the Bishop and a precious feet pin are provided for the **OVERALL** winner. The **Level winners** will receive a certificate of participation signed by the Director of HLD. These are mailed to the contact name on the submission form

- 3. Catholic Schools Week We encourage you to use this program and display all entries during Catholic Schools Week.
- 4. Presenting Certificates Please make the presentation of the certificates into a special occasion if possible. You could recognize the children after a Sunday Mass, at a graduation ceremony, or on the last night of religious education. Please invite the parents to your awards ceremony. This supports our goal of family conversation about life issues. The Office of HLD visits 2 schools to present awards in person.





Theology of Her/His Body by Jason Evert


